The 2017 Annual Report is submitted for your review.

This year has been a year of transition for the Willard Police Department. New leadership has been promoted and several new hires have been added. In January, Andrew Handshoe was selected to fill the open position of police/fire/EMS dispatcher. In March, Brandon Malson was hired to replace Officer Craig Ritz, who had resigned in February. In April, Officer Seth Mahon was promoted to Sergeant, effectively filling the void that Sgt. Adam Strong left when promoted to Assistant Chief later in 2017. In June, Police Chief Mark Holden retired, replaced by Shannon Chaffins. In July, Christopher Myers is selected for a full-time police officer position. Part-time Officer Robert McLaughlin also resigned at the end of 2017.

The promotions from within our organization have led to many employees' learning their new positions. I believe we are effectively filling the gap left by those who have left our organization, and those who have been promoted. However, in 2018, we will continue to train our new leadership and officers/dispatchers to continue on the path of improvement, leading to a more effective police department.

In the upcoming year, (2) additional officers will be EMD (Emergency Medical Dispatch) certified in January. The EMD and dispatch class is taught by Capt. Weiss of the Willard Fire Department. We will continue to send officers to this training as it is available to help diversify the services and skills of our officers. Officer Salazar will be attending SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) training in London, Ohio. The training is a week-long school centered around basic SWAT functions and their related tactics. Officer Salazar will be joining the Huron County Special Response Team, that is currently training with the Norwalk SRT. Officer Poggiali will also attend Revolver Instructor School in May, to help round out his initial firearms instructor training he had attended in 2017.

The highlights of 2017 are attached to this annual report. The highlights attached I believe are an effective overview of the service Willard Police Department provide to our community.


Overall, property crimes (Breaking and Entering, Burglary, Criminal Damaging/Vandalism) have decreased, and overall drug crimes have increased from 2016 to 2017. Also attached is a comparison of overdoses from 2016 and 2017. You will notice a significant increase in overdoses and resultant deaths. The increase is attributed to heroin being mixed with other synthetic opioids, including fentanyl and carafentanyl. The laboratory analyses of the drugs we take off the street verify this fact.

*"Dedicated to Providing a Safer Community"*

In 2017, the Willard Police Department implemented a Senior Watch program, where officers make contact with elderly citizens at least once per week. The program targets seniors that live at home alone, and/or have no family living close by to check on them regularly. The program was proposed and implemented by Officer Brian Slone. A sample brochure/application is attached.

The annual Bike Rodeo was combined this year with a Touch-A-Truck, with combined efforts from Sgt. Gillmor and members of the Willard Fire Department and Recreation Department. The Bike Rodeo/Touch-a-Truck was a huge success due to the efforts of everyone involved.

We are committed to providing police services and friendly assistance in a professional and courteous manner. We fully expect our efforts will contribute to enhancing the quality of life for our citizens, and make Willard a better place to live, work, and play.

## YEAR IN REVIEW, 2017

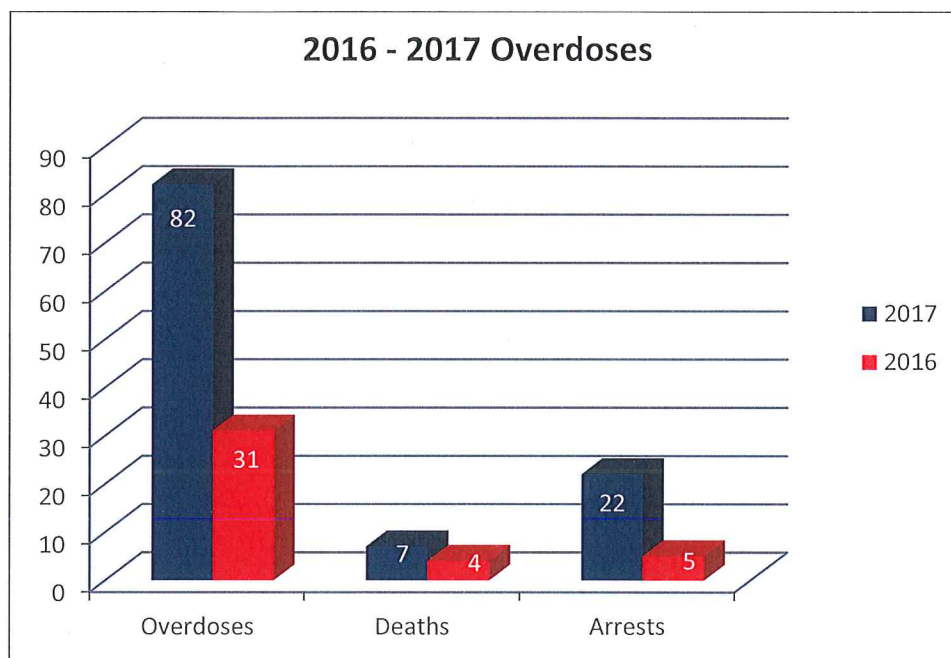
- January 18th, 2017 – Ofcr. Ritz stops a suspicious male subject, who is identified as Joe Fusko. Fusko is found to be carrying a large amount of heroin. Officers are able to determine that Fusko is out on bond for trafficking carafentanyl. Fusko's bond is revoked and receives a two year prison sentence for all of the offenses.
- January 21<sup>st</sup>, 2017 – WPD received a call from a neighbor of the Willard Athletic Complex that two male subjects are breaking into the concession stand. Sgt. Gillmor and Ofcr. Wilson respond and locate the two suspects. Both males are released to their parents, with charges pending from Huron County Juvenile Court.
- January 26th, 2017 – Detectives use a search warrant to search a room at the Willard Country Inn. As a result, two suspects are arrested for possession of cocaine and possession of prescription pills.
- February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2017 – Det. Gilliam and Sgt. Mahon respond to Rite Aid, where a female was acting intoxicated. The female located inside the store, where she sprays an unknown liquid from a syringe in an attempt to destroy evidence. The female is arrested and charged with tampering with evidence.
- February 14<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Antonio Kimbro is arrested for numerous theft charges after several complaints are filed against him. Kimbro had allegedly stolen a wallet from a citizen, and stolen numerous telephones from in the preceding weeks.
- March 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2017 – Oklahoma authorities alert Willard Police to a possibly armed male subject in a stolen vehicle in the Willard area. Sgt. Adam Strong locates the vehicle, initiating a vehicle pursuit. The suspect is apprehended after the vehicle chase, and then a foot pursuit with the assistance of other officers and detectives. The vehicle involved was found to be stolen. A run-away female juvenile was found inside the city by investigators. The run-away was found to have been transported by the suspect from Oklahoma. Two days later, officers locate a stolen RV from Oklahoma that they suspect was brought to Willard by the suspect as well.
- April 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officer Salazar responds to a suspicious person complaint near Circle K. Officer Salazar locates the suspect, who is found carrying a loaded 9mm semi-automatic pistol. The subject is arrested and incarcerated.

- April 17<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officer Kelbley investigates burglaries at (2) at local churches. Officer Kelbley develops a suspect, who confesses to both burglaries to detectives.
- April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Police Department units assist Willard EMS with an apparent overdose. Officers find a second overdose victim in a separate room. Children are removed from the home as a result, and criminal charges pending against the adults.
- May 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Sgt. Weiss and Ofcr. Poggiali investigate a shots fired call on the corner of Dale Street and Long Street. Damage is found to a home on the corner of Woodbine Street and Long Street, believed to be from the shots fired from Dale/Long Street.
- May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Sgt. Strong and Ofcr. Malson respond to a welfare check request, and discover (2) children with multiple bruises and injuries. Detectives are called to investigate, along with Huron County Children Services. One charged adult subject is awaiting sentencing, and another is awaiting trial.
- June 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officers respond to a double overdose at a Spring Street address. One victim is pronounced dead at the scene, the other survives.
- June 7<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Willard P.D., along with the Ohio Gaming Commission and other law enforcement agencies, use 6 search warrants, which are served simultaneously in four separate jurisdictions. The Do Drop Inn is among the businesses that are searched.
- July 6<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officers respond to 28 Spring Street, where shots were fired at the residence, and one person was injured. A suspect is developed and is arrested in connection with the shooting and is currently awaiting trial. Detective Gilliam, Sgt. Gillmor, and along with other members of the Willard Police Department, Norwalk Police Department, and Huron County Sheriff's Office serve several search warrants on the days after the incident, collecting evidence and eventually arresting a suspect.
- Sept. 7<sup>th</sup>, 2017- Leanne Howell and Amanda Moore are arrested during a burglary in progress call. Howell is sentenced to 12 months in prison. Moore is still awaiting sentencing.
- October 11<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Sgt. Mahon, Ofcr. Poggiali, and Ofcr. Salazar arrest Reynaldo Garcia after a vehicle pursuit inside the city.
- November 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officer Slone responds to 304 W. Pearl Street for a small child that is unconscious. Children Services is contacted after the initial investigation shows that the child had possibly been exposed to dangerous drugs. Two suspects are arrested and incarcerated after an investigation by Sgt. Gillmor and Det. Gilliam.



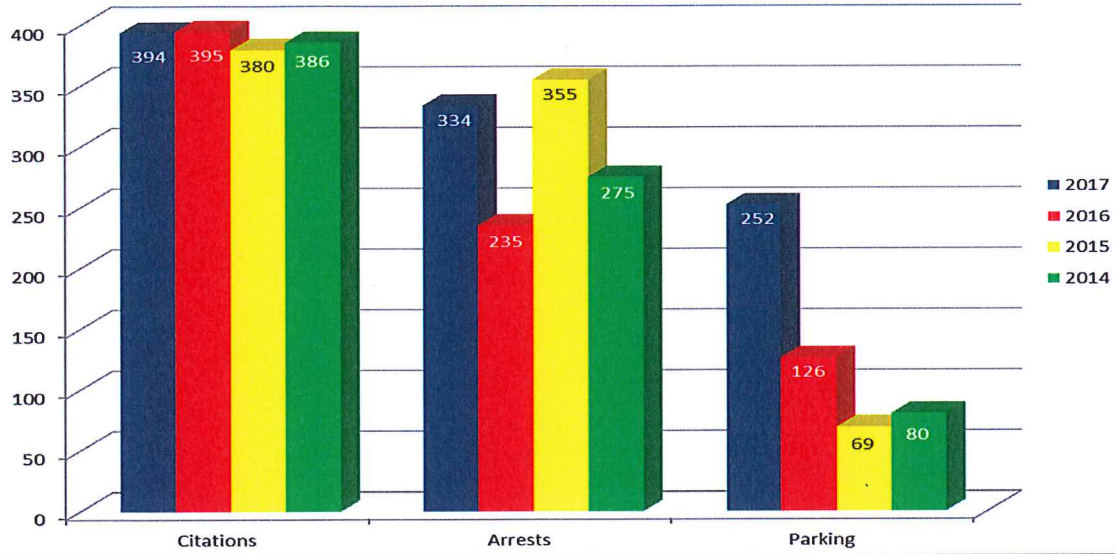
- November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officers respond to a bomb threat at MTD. The main plant is evacuated and searched for explosives, but none are found. Detectives are currently investigating.
- December 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017 – Officers are called to O'Reilley's auto parts store for a male subject with a gun. When Officers arrive, the male subject is located in the parking lot. Officers have to remove the gun from the male's hand, which is found to be unloaded. The subject is found to have dementia and is released to his caretaker. The gun is confiscated until it can be released to a family member.

## 2017 OVERDOSE STATISTICS

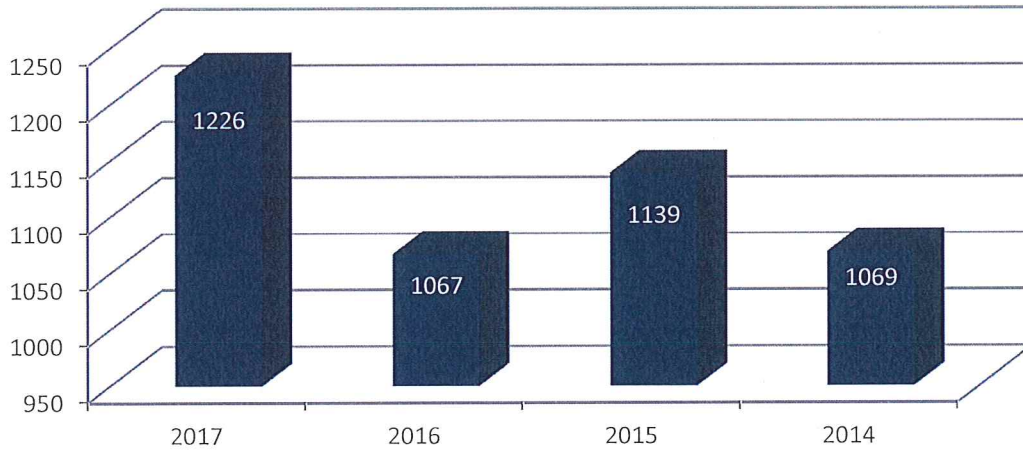


- Officers assist Willard EMS with **82** overdose complaints in **2017**, compared to **31** in **2016**.
- The **82** overdoses in **2017** resulted in **22** arrests, with many more additional criminal charges dependent upon laboratory analysis. In **2016**, **5** arrests were made for the **31** overdose calls
- Of the **82** overdoses in **2017**, **7** were fatal. Of the **31** overdoses in **2016**, **4** were fatal.

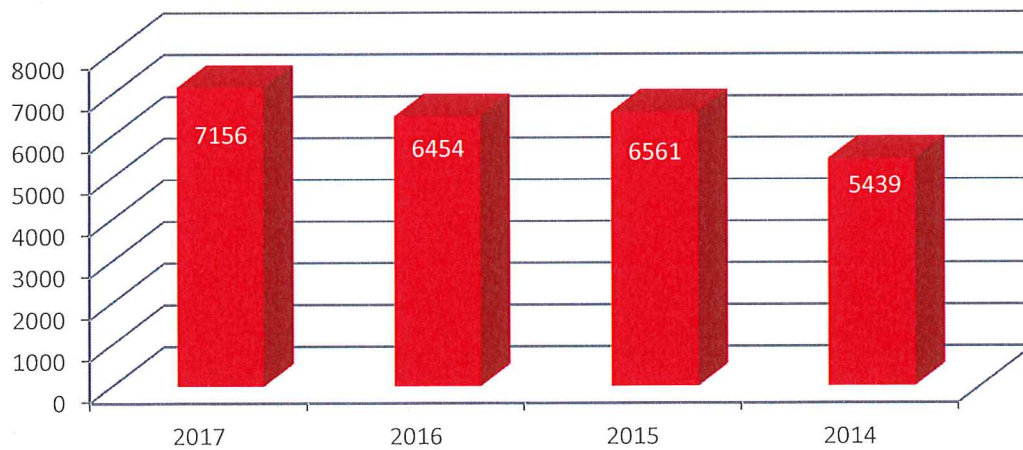
### 2016 - 2017 Citations, Arrests and Parking



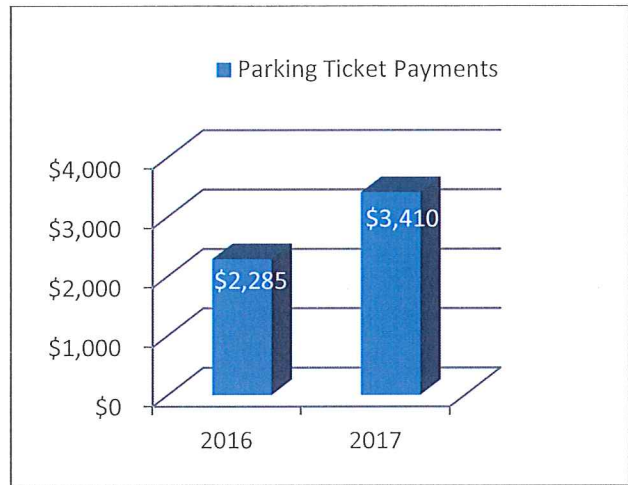
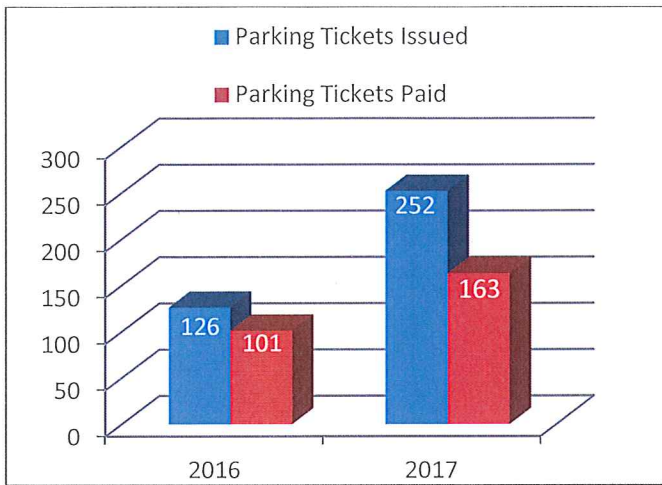
### Traffic Stop Frequency Comparison

# Willard Police Department Parking Enforcement Bureau Annual Report



- 252 Parking Tickets were issued in 2017
- 163 of those 252 (65%) have been paid as of 12/31/17 for a total of \$3,410
- 126 Parking Tickets were issued in 2016
- 101 of those 126 (80%) had been paid as of 12/31/16 for a total of \$2,285
- Income was increased by 49% from 2016 to 2017
- 30 tickets were sent to collections in 2017
  - 3 of those 30 (10%) of those tickets have been collected
  - 27 (90%) are still outstanding
- As of 12/31/2017 there are 59 tickets with collections totaling \$4,160

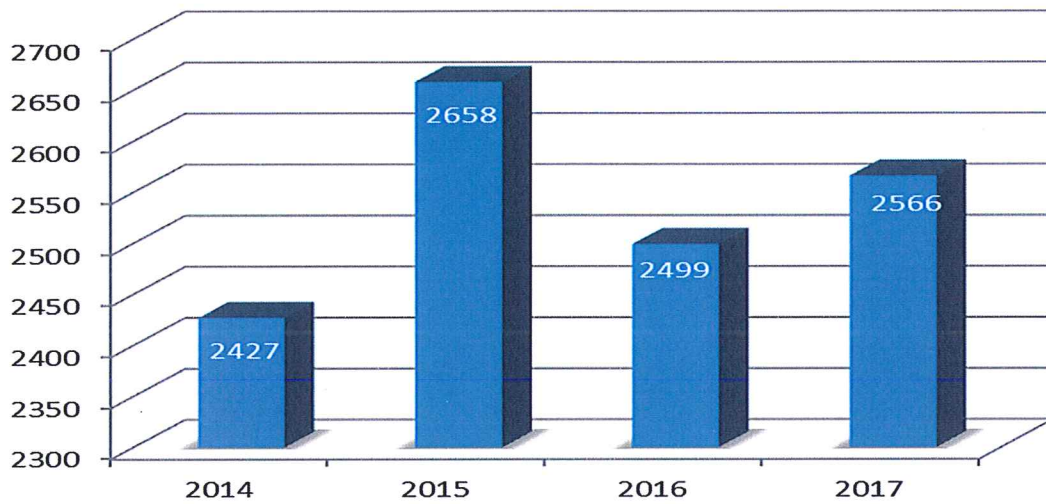

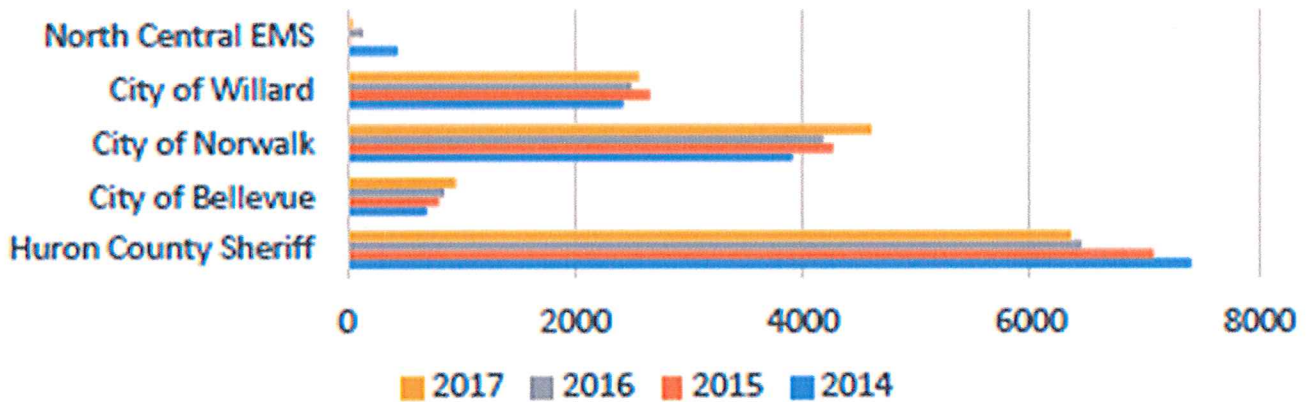

## Incoming 9-1-1 Calls to Willard P.D.



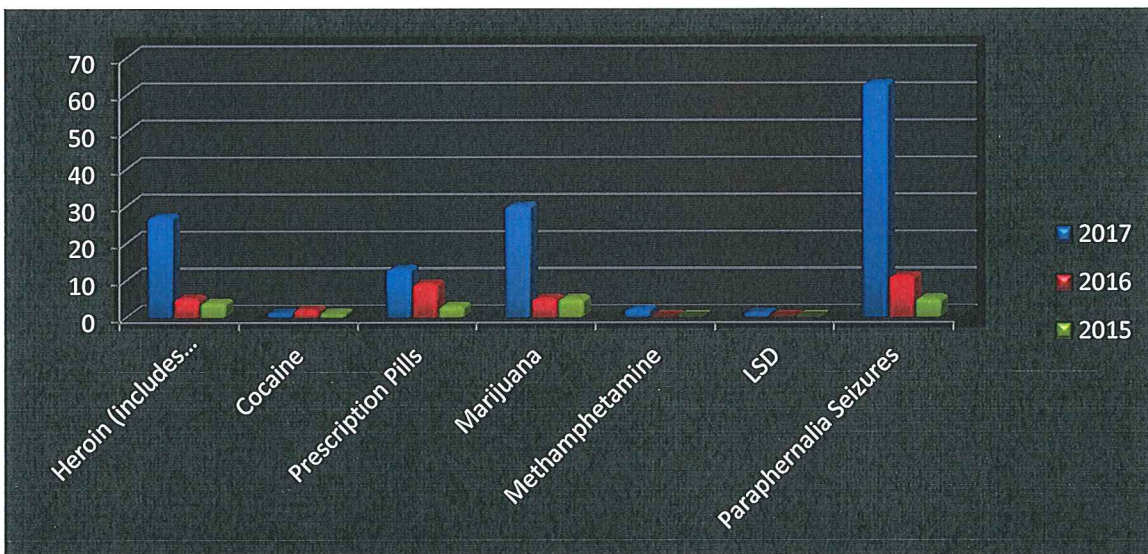
## 4 Year 9-1-1 Call Comparison, Per PSAP

In January 2017, Huron County elected James Sitterly as the new prosecutor. With Mr. Sitterly's appointment came a new team at the Huron County Prosecutor office. This team has proven to be aggressive on penalties for offenders, and has led to several persons in and around the City of Willard receiving tougher sentencing for crimes that they have committed.

As a result of the new Prosecuting team, some of this year's sentences are as follows:

Tara Thacker – 8 years - Involuntary Manslaughter

Nicholas Kade Hamman – 5 years for crimes including Grand Theft (auto), Burglary, Heroin Possession, and other crimes were part of the conviction agreement

Delores Ceja – 4 years – Aggravated Trafficking Heroin, Cocaine, Suboxone

Michael Barnett – 3 years – Aggravated Trafficking Heroin, Receiving Stolen Property

Matthew Sweet – 3 years – Trafficking Heroin, Possession of Heroin

Joseph Fusko – 3 years – Trafficking Heroin, Possession of Heroin

Christa Lane – Cash and residence forfeiture – Aggravated Trafficking Heroin in School Zone, Aiding and Abetting Trafficking in School Zone, Possession of Carfentanil, Possession of Heroin (Lane is a first-time offender)

Marc Barnett – 2 years – Trafficking Heroin, Mr. Barnett has another case that is in the trial stage stemming from a shooting that includes charges including 6 counts of Attempted Murder and a list of other offences

Amanda Moore – 17 months – Trafficking Heroin, Breaking and Entering

Eddie Tackett – 17 months – Trafficking Heroin

Phillip Faulkner – 1 year – Trafficking Suboxone

LeAnn Howell – 1 year – Breaking and Entering

Several other offenders received other lesser penalties for their involvement in crimes.

Through 2017 Willard Detectives worked a variety of investigations. This is a small synopsis of some of those investigations:

**January 2017:** In January 2017, Willard Police Department executed a search warrant on a residence in January that led to the seizure of Heroin, narcotic paraphernalia, and \$604.00 in U.S. Currency. 2 people were arrested during this search warrant.

**February 2017:** During February 2017, Willard Police Department executed a search warrant on the residence of 716 Park Street. Located during the search warrant was a small amount of narcotics, some narcotic paraphernalia, and \$4762.00 in U.S. Currency. This search warrant was in response to investigations into several resident's activity in narcotic trafficking that included Heroin, Fentanyl, Carfentanil, and other synthetic opioids that have been responsible for fatal narcotic overdoses. One of the residents of this address died of a fatal narcotic overdose on 05/20/2017 inside this residence. As a result of the narcotic investigations and search warrants executed, Christa Lane (one of the property owners) forfeited her interest in the property and the money seized during the search warrant. This residence has been a haven for narcotic activity since the prior resident passed away and left the house to family members. This seizure/forfeiture is another attempt to pass the message that there is ZERO tolerance for narcotic activity in the City of Willard.

**March 2017:** On March 24, 2017 during Grand Jury proceedings, Willard Police Department was responsible for presenting 44 cases involving 15 people in and around Willard. This indictment list was primarily the result of narcotic investigations but also included indictments for a fatal overdose where a resident was indicted for Involuntary Manslaughter, and another involving an Oklahoma male that possessed stolen vehicles recovered in Willard. During this stolen vehicle investigation, information was obtained and forwarded to the proper jurisdictions that assisted with investigations regarding each Grand Theft of vehicles and firearms, and Burglary crimes committed in Illinois and Oklahoma. Also during March, Willard Police assisted Huron County Sheriff Department in creating and executing 3 residential search warrants related to a large-scale Marijuana growing operation located just outside the Willard City limits. One of the residences searched was in the City of Willard. The court proceedings related to these search



warrants included substantial seizures of property by the Huron County Sheriff Department, and the cases are still in the court system at this time.

**April 2017:** April contained a Grand Jury proceeding that Willard Police Department presented cases against 3 Willard residents that included 25 counts including trafficking and possession of a wide assortment of narcotics, and numerous weapons violations. Included in these indictments, several items of property (including a well-known narcotic dealer's signature car), were also seized and are eligible for forfeiture because of their involvement in the crimes committed. Seizing this unique vehicle is another effort to get the message across to the residents about our combat against narcotic activity in the City of Willard.

**June 2017:** June 2017 contained 15 Grand Jury indictments from 7 individuals living in and around the Willard area. On June 7, 2017 6 search warrants were simultaneously executed in each the City of Willard, Huron County, Perkins Township, and the City of Tiffin. This joint event was led by the Ohio Casino Commission and was in response to information that was passed to the Casino Commission in 2015 by Det. McLaughlin.

**July 2017:** On July 6, 2017 a Willard residence was shot, which led to a juvenile being struck by a bullet during the attack. This led to an extensive investigation that included the Huron County Sheriff Department. During the investigation an individual was identified as being responsible for the shooting, and he is currently on trial for crimes related to the event. Also during the investigation, a substantial amount of money and narcotics were located and seized from another Willard resident who was already on bond for an assortment of crimes including narcotic and weapons crimes.

**August/September 2017:** August and September 2017 contained some more Grand Jury involvement including 8 people indicted on 24 crimes. Also during August 2017, a joint investigation including Norwalk Police Department led to the arrest of a female for prostitution in our Downtown District. This investigation, as well as a September prostitution investigation that had another arrested female was in response to resident and business complaints of the presence of solicitation around the Downtown businesses.

**November 2017:** On November 10, 2017 Willard Police Department executed a search warrant on a residence during an investigation into counterfeit money that was being passed at local businesses in and around the City of Willard. Counterfeit currency, narcotic paraphernalia, and a large amount of Methamphetamine was located and seized as result of this search warrant. 2 residents were arrested and are currently facing charges for their involvement.

Other notable events in 2018 that the Willard Detective Bureau took part of include:

March 20, 2017: One Detective attended a Project Lifesaver course, and became certified to use issued equipment related to the program. This national program issues tracking devices intended for locating missing persons with Dementia, Epilepsy, Alzheimer's disease, Autism,

Down syndrome and other related illnesses. The course teaches how to use the tracking device that was provided at no cost to our City.

Willard Police Department took part in a national Drug Take-back event in each April and October. During the events residents turned in approximately 81.5lbs of medication. This event is focused in keeping expired and unwanted medication from getting into the wrong hands or becoming abused.

Detective(s) also assisted in events including the May Bike Rodeo (Organized by the Juvenile Officer), August Liquor Compliance event (Organized by the Juvenile Officer), and in December assisted with a drug takeback that was organized by a Willard student as a Senior project. The Detective Bureau also in November did a Community event at the Willard Library with library staff in which a Detective shared a book with children, passed out some items to the attendees, made the children "Honorary Library Detectives", and did a show and tell event with the assistance of 2 Officers (Sgt. Gillmor and Ofc. Hall). This event allowed the children to interact with Officers and do a "hands-on" demonstration with a Willard Police Cruiser where the children got to activate lights, sirens, and the P.A. system on the cruiser.

The Willard Detective Bureau assisted Norwalk Police Department, and Huron County Sheriff Departments on several additional search warrants in their jurisdictions through 2017 as well. Assistance was also given to BCI, FBI, Ohio Casino Commission, and Ohio Attorney General Office in several other investigations and search warrants throughout the 2017 year.

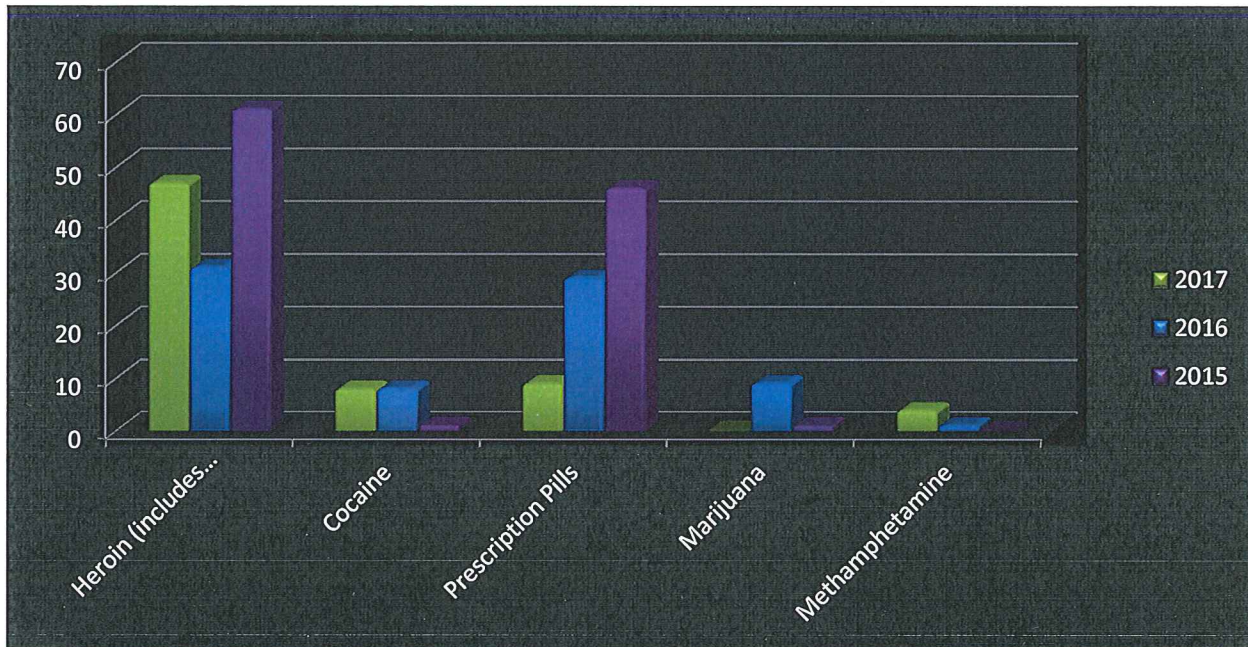

## Juvenile Officer's Annual Report

2017

The 2017 year case complaints handled increased approximately 7% from 2016. The reduction in alcohol sales to minors was one goal achieved as well as educating youth on internet safety. Throughout the year, the Juvenile Officer assisted the detective in numerous drug trafficking complaints and other criminal cases. In addition to assisting the detective bureau and school resource officer, the juvenile officer also assisted with road patrol & dispatching duties. The juvenile officer also spent time assisting other departments with IT, Computer, & Telephony needs. Other highlights from the juvenile office include:

### January 2017 – May 2017 / August 2017 – December 2017

Participated in 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Mentoring program. The program consists of meeting with mentee once a week and is part of the Willard Community Connectors Program.

**March 2017** Provided and organized "Alcohol Server Knowledge (ASK)" Training at Willard Country Kitchen. The program educates clerks, bartenders, and employees on the laws of serving alcohol. There were over 30 people participating from the surrounding area.

**May 2017** Conducted the Bike Rodeo at the Willard Park. There were 115 bikes that participated in the course. The course and program teaches kids about bicycle safety. Officers spoke to children at Willard Schools about Bicycle Safety. This year the Bike Rodeo was combined with the "Touch a Truck" event. The Program allows children and their parents to look and sit in various vehicles. A Mercy Hospital Life Flight Helicopter flew in to participate in the event.

**August 2017** Alcohol compliance checks conducted on city wide liquor licenses. 5 businesses were cited for liquor violations and 1 tobacco violation. All five were convicted in Norwalk Municipal Court as well as complaints filed with the Ohio Investigative Unit.

**September 2017** Participated in AAA Youth Driver Competition Program at South Central High School. The program consists of students from area high schools and rates them based on how well they perform on a driving course. Willard High School participated in the challenge. In 2018 Willard High School will be hosting this event.

**November 2017** Conducted a presentation on "Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse" to Willard United Methodist Church Group. Approximately 30 people were present.

**December 2017** Conducted a community wide Digital Citizenship and internet safety seminar at Willard High School. The project was created through Project Leadership of Huron County. Over 80 people attended the presentation.

In conclusion, goals set for the Juvenile Office for 2018 include:

- To have zero alcohol and tobacco sales violations for 2018 by continuing to provide training to area merchants prior to compliance checks.
- To provide more awareness and education to students regarding internet safety to reduce the chances of being victimized.
- To continue to participate and improve the community programs conducted in the past.

- Chaperoned Junior/Senior Prom.
- Began planning for Safety Town for 2018-2019 school year.

## **Safety Issues**

- Began looking at alternate routes of evacuation for fire alarms and intruder evacuations.
- Closed off one lane of Main St. loop in mornings to allow students to safely exit vehicles on curb side and driver side of vehicles.
- Installed No Parking and Fire Lane Markings in loop on Main St and also in rear loop of school.

## **Police issues**


- Began No Association Order paperwork for students (77 orders issued for 2017)
