The 2018 Annual Report is submitted for your review.

In 2018, we have all worked together to provide a safer environment for our citizens. The detective, juvenile officer, school resource officer, dispatchers, patrol division, and administration has worked closely with the public to solve the problems we face as a community. I believe the public has taken notice of our efforts, and, as a result, we have been able to successfully pass the levy which funds our detective, juvenile officer, and school resource officer.

2018 has been a successful year for the Willard Police Department. As you will note in the pages to follow, the overdoses that accompany the opioid crisis have significantly decreased by at least 75%, and continue its downward trend. As you know, drug usage goes hand-in-hand with other crimes. Burglaries and Breaking and Entering complaints have significantly dropped off as well, with both being reduced by at least 75%.

Although there has been an overall reduction of crime within the City of Willard, The Willard Police Department alone cannot take credit for it all. The Willard Police Department has enjoyed an excellent working relationship with many area agencies, including the Huron County Sheriff's Office, Huron County Prosecutor's Office, our Law Director's Office, the Ohio State Highway Patrol, the Huron County Probation and Parole Office, the U.S. Marshall's Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force, Norwalk Police Department, and many more agencies. The information sharing among agencies has been a huge advantage for us.

Working together with other agencies has resulted in many arrests, but none of this is possible without participation from the citizens we serve. Many have taken a stand against the criminal element in our city; it's those people that are really on the front lines. We will do everything we can to protect them and support their efforts.

Although overdoses and property crimes continue to decrease, we will continue our efforts to ensure that Willard remains a safe place for our citizens, and look forward to a continued decrease in our criminal element in 2019.

Notable Calls for Service and Court Dispositions, 2019

January 17th, 2018 – Officers are dispatched to a W. Pearl Street address for an apparent overdose. Officers get no answer at the door, so forcible entry is made. A male subject is found to be coherent, but is arrested on an outstanding warrant from the Norwalk Municipal Court. The male is also charged with Possession of Marijuana.

February 22nd, 2018 – Willard Police and Fire Departments respond to an overdose complaint at the Willard Country Inn. Officers locate a male subject that had been seen fleeing the room prior to officer's arrival. The male subject is carrying a child, and runs from officers. The male subject is caught and charged with child endangering, resisting arrest, and criminal damaging. The subject is sentenced to 90 days in jail for the offenses. The male subject also had an active warrant through the Richland County Sheriff's Office, and was transferred to the Richland County Jail after serving his sentence.

Feb. 25th, 2018 – Ofcr. Salazar stops a vehicle on Dale Street after receiving a suspicious vehicle complaint. One subject is arrested on an outstanding warrant, and another subject is arrested after a loaded gun is found inside the vehicle. A significant amount of suspected crack cocaine and heroin are confiscated as a result of the arrests. Bryton Holden is sentenced to 4.5 years in prison for the offenses.

February 26th, 2018 – Reynaldo Garcia is arrested on an indictment from the Huron County Common Pleas Court for inducing panic. The indictment stems from an investigation by Det. Gilliam from a bomb threat made on November 30th, 2017. Garcia is sentenced to 6 Months in a CBCF and 5 years of probation. The sentence includes a separate charge of Fleeing and Eluding, stemming from a vehicle pursuit in the city that was initiated by Sgt. Mahon on October 11th, 2017.

March 20th, 2018 – A resident advises his vehicle is stolen. Officer Slone observes the vehicle being operated by a female subject. Officer Slone stops the vehicle. The female operator is charged with No Operator's License. A female passenger is arrested on an outstanding warrant, and charged with drug paraphernalia offenses. The vehicle is towed from the scene after attempts to contact the vehicle owner fail. The owner failed to submit a formal stolen vehicle affidavit or pursue any charges.

March 22nd, 2018 – A Spring Street resident advises a male subject had just been stabbed in the chest. The suspect ran from the Spring Street location. Sgt. Gillmor and Det. Gilliam locate the suspect, after using information relayed from officers on scene. Brandon Johnson, 27, is arrested and charged with felonious assault. After a jury trial, Johnson is found not guilty on all charges.

April 12th, 2018 – Officer Hall and Officer Malson arrest Austin Burton at Missler's IGA for a shoplifting complaint. Burton is found to be in possession of over \$1,000 in stolen merchandise, and is taken to the Huron County Jail for a felony theft charge. Burton is found guilty of Robbery and sentenced to 3 years of probation and 90 days in jail.

May 2nd, 2018 – Det. Gilliam arrests Dustin Burton for receiving stolen property in connection with several theft from vehicle complaints the previous month. Burton is also charged with Breaking and Entering from a local business. Burton is sentenced to 90 days in jail and 3 years of probation. Shortly after being released from jail on a recognizance bond, Burton overdoses at a Spring Street residence. Burton is re-arrested and his bond revoked by the court.

June 20th, 2018 – Ofcr. Weiss spots a suspicious male subject looking into Hy-Miler and stops to investigate. The male subject gives a false name to Sgt. Weiss and is arrested. The male is found to have an active warrant for his arrest from Tennessee for Robbery. The male subject is transported to the Huron County Jail to wait for an extradition hearing.

July 5th, 2018 – Officer Kelbley observes a male subject carrying a television on Clark Street during night time hours. Officer Kelbley approaches the subject, who attempts to hide underneath a vehicle. The male subject is arrested for underage consumption, and is found with drug paraphernalia. The television is determined to be stolen from a nearby residence, in which the male subject stays occasionally. The male subject is charged with Receiving Stolen Property, Drug Paraphernalia, and Underage Consumption. The male subject is also found to have an outstanding warrant through Norwalk Municipal Court.

August 8th, 2018 – Officer Malson observes suspicious activity at the Willard Country Inn and makes a traffic stop. The driver appears to have overdosed, and Officer Reel starts CPR. Willard EMS transports the male to the hospital. The male subject is charged with drug paraphernalia offenses and OVI.

August 9th, 2018 – Officers are dispatched for a hit/skip accident at KFC. Officer Malson and Officer Myers locate the vehicle and operator at the Pin Oak Apartments. The male operator is determined to be intoxicated and is arrested for OVI.

Sept. 21st, 2018 – Dispatch received a telephone call of a possible stolen vehicle from the city. Shortly after the phone call, Ofcr. Myers observes the vehicle on W. Laurel Street. Ofcr. Myers stops the vehicle and identifies the driver as the complainant's juvenile son. The juvenile is charged with Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle, along with Delinquency and Curfew. Several other juveniles are located in the vehicle as well, one of whom is found to be in possession of drug paraphernalia. The passenger juveniles are charged appropriately as well.

October 30th, 2018 – Officers respond to an injury traffic crash on Spring Street. Officer's determine the operator had overdosed while operating the vehicle. Both driver and passenger are transported to the hospital. The driver is later charged with Aggravated Vehicular Assault, as the passenger's injuries are significant. The passenger faces charges of Possession of Heroin/Fentanyl as well.

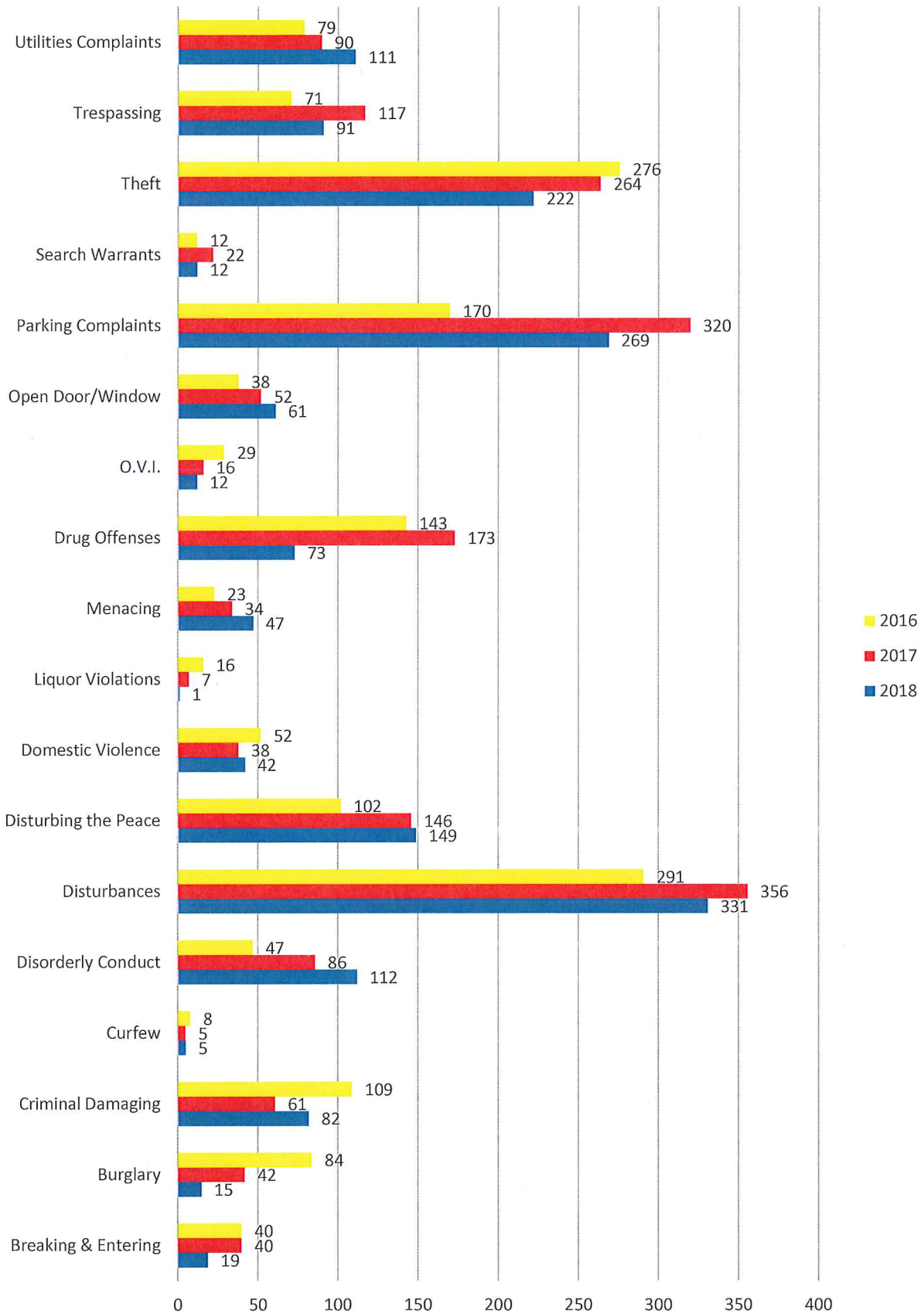
November 5th, 2018 – Officers are dispatched to a Loris Lane residence, in which the caller states that his live-in girlfriend is "acting strange." Officers determine that both the caller and the female subject are impaired, and observe two young children in the home. Both subjects are arrested for Child Endangering and incarcerated. Both subjects are sentenced to 60 days in jail later in the month.

December 3rd, 2018 – Officer Myers conducts a traffic stop on U.S. 224. Officer Myers observes furtive movements inside the vehicle, which leads to the discovery of suspected crack cocaine. Two female subjects are arrested in connection with the crack cocaine and transported to the Huron County Jail.

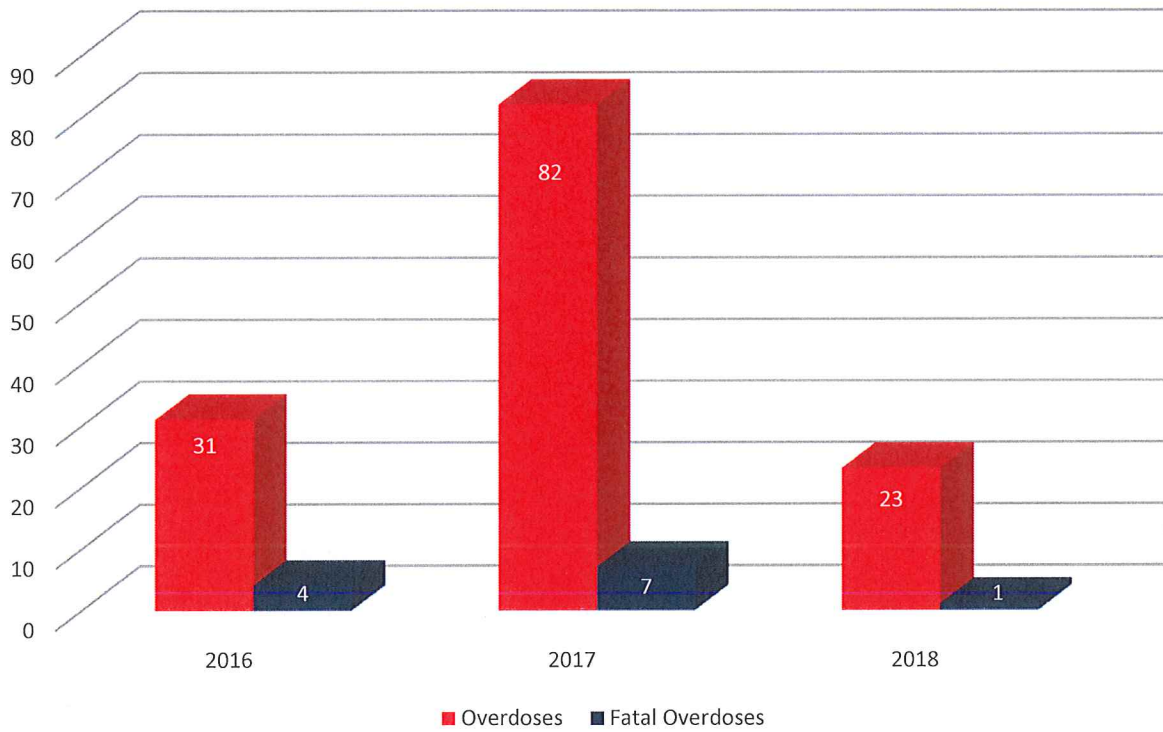
December 26th, 2018 – Officer Malson and Officer Myers locate a male subject with an active warrant from the Huron County Sheriff's Office. The same male subject is also the suspect in an on-going investigation in regards to a stolen credit card. The male subject makes admissions from his involvement in the stolen credit card upon being interviewed. Reports are forwarded to the law director's office for filing of formal charges.

December 28th, 2018 – A Clark Street resident reports that (2) firearms were stolen from his residence earlier in the month. Det. Gilliam interviews the suspect, who is incarcerated at the Huron County Jail for the December 26th incident above. Det. Gilliam secures a full confession from the suspect, and charges are referred to the Huron County Prosecutor's Office.

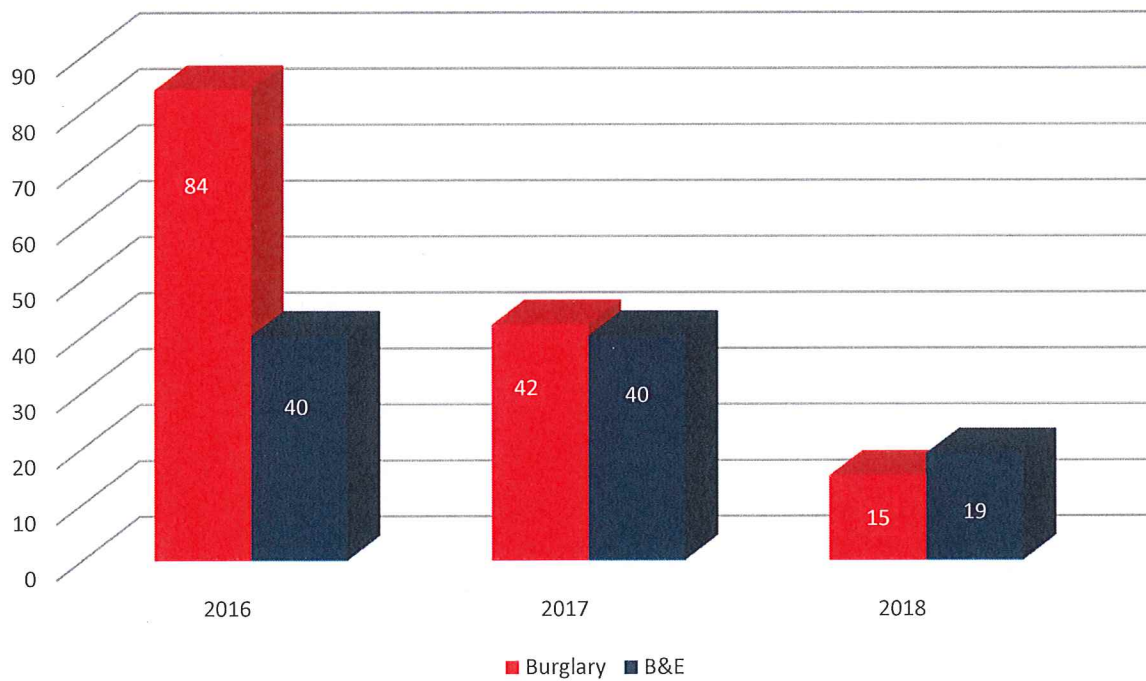
Call For Service Type Comparison 2016-2018



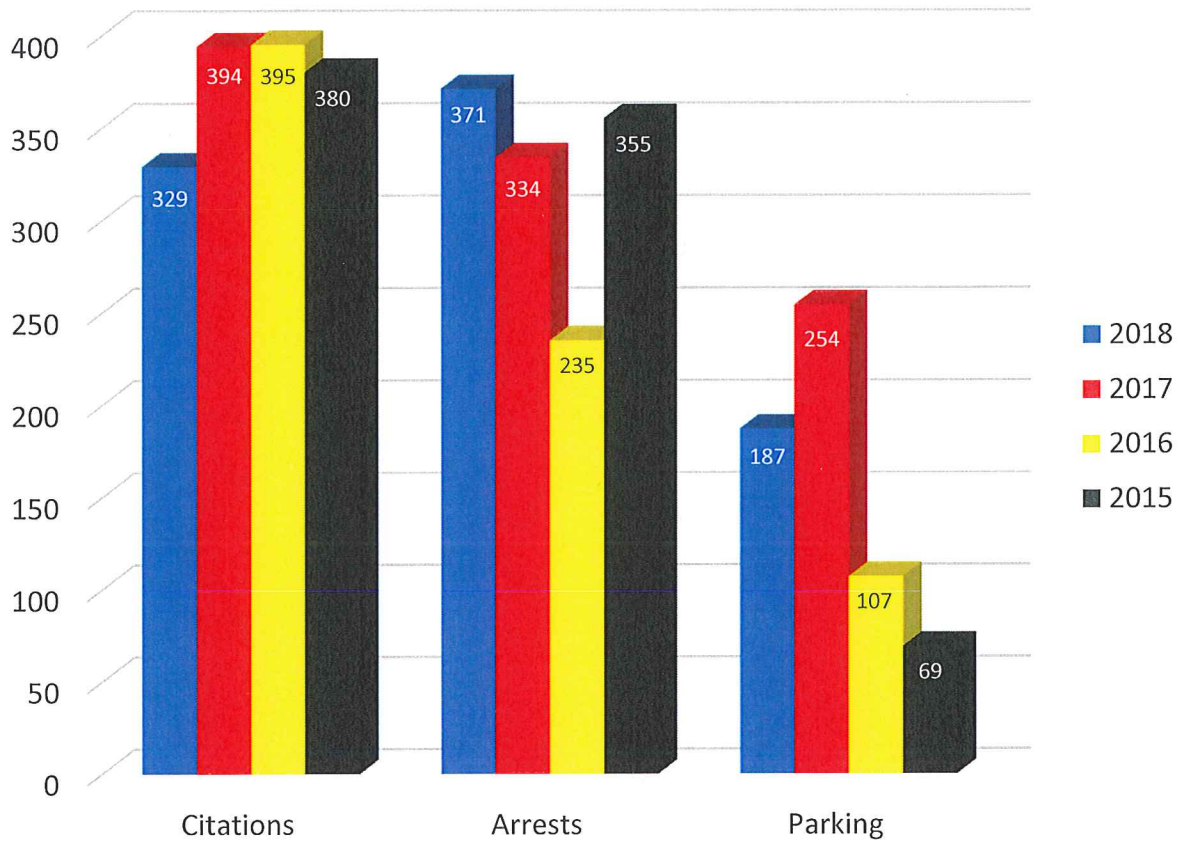
3 Year Overdose Comparison



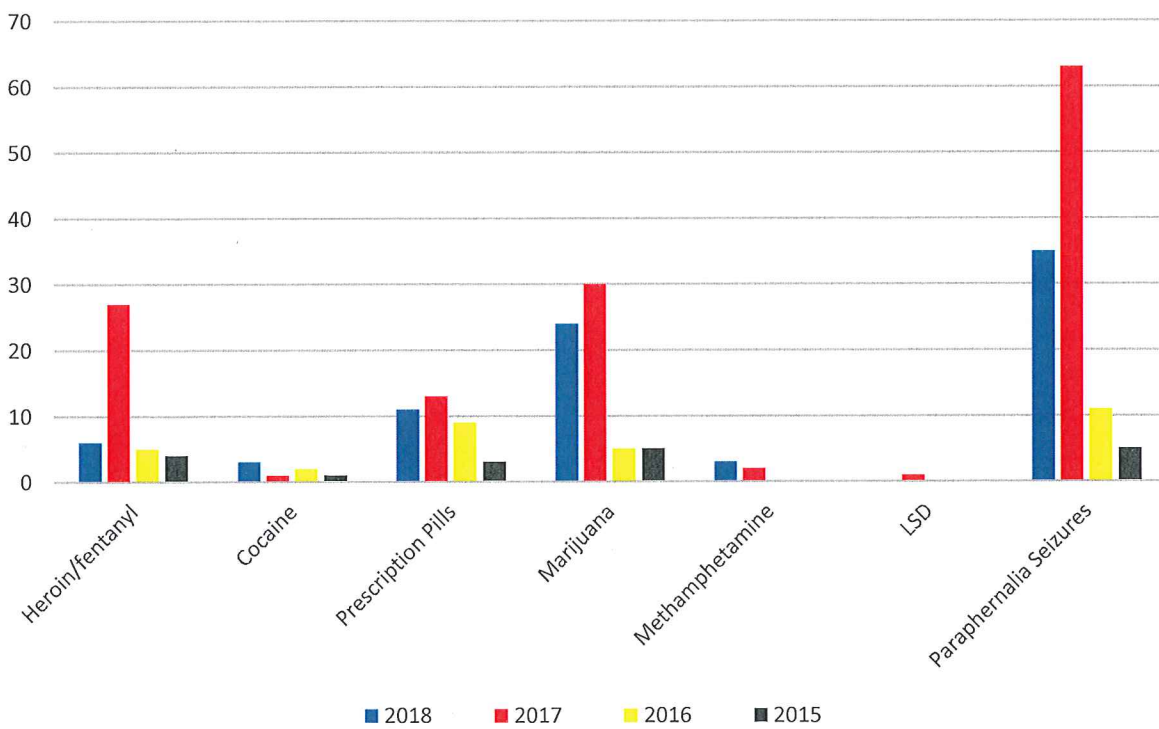
3 Year Burglary and Breaking and Entering Comparison



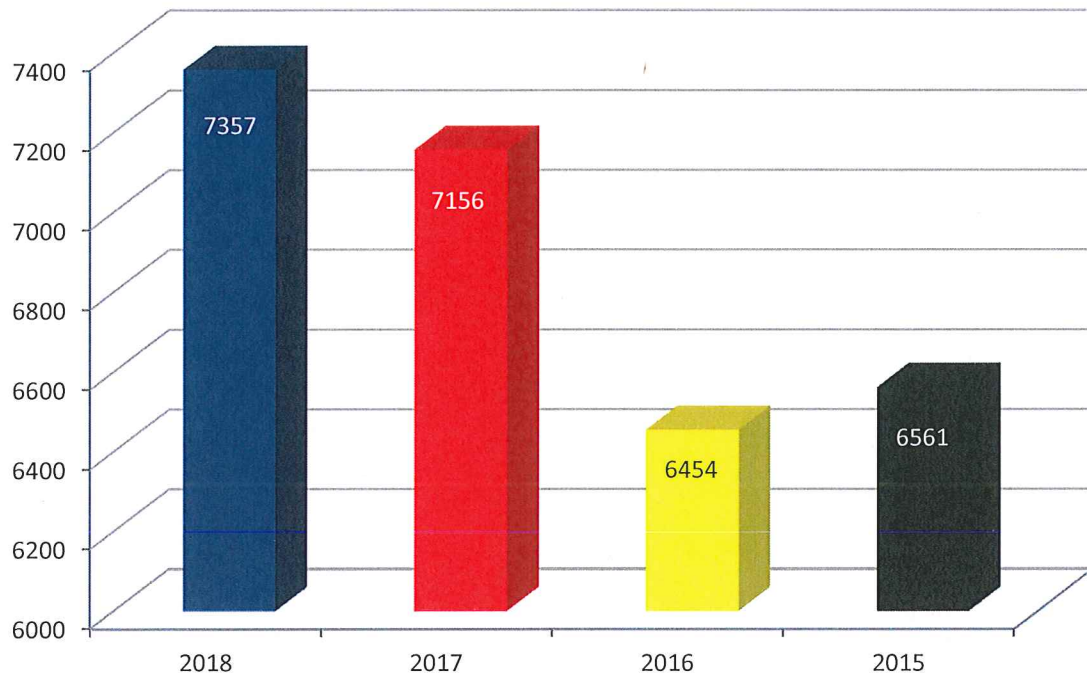
2015 - 2018 Citations, Arrests and Parking



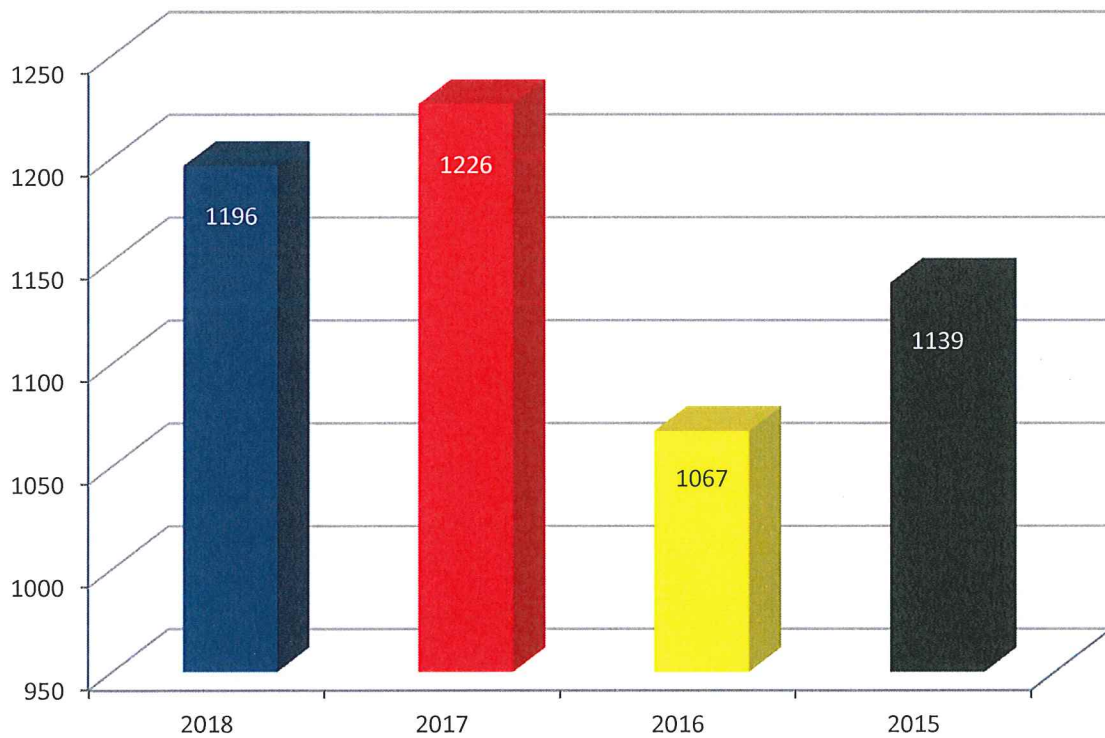
Drug Seizures, 2015-2018



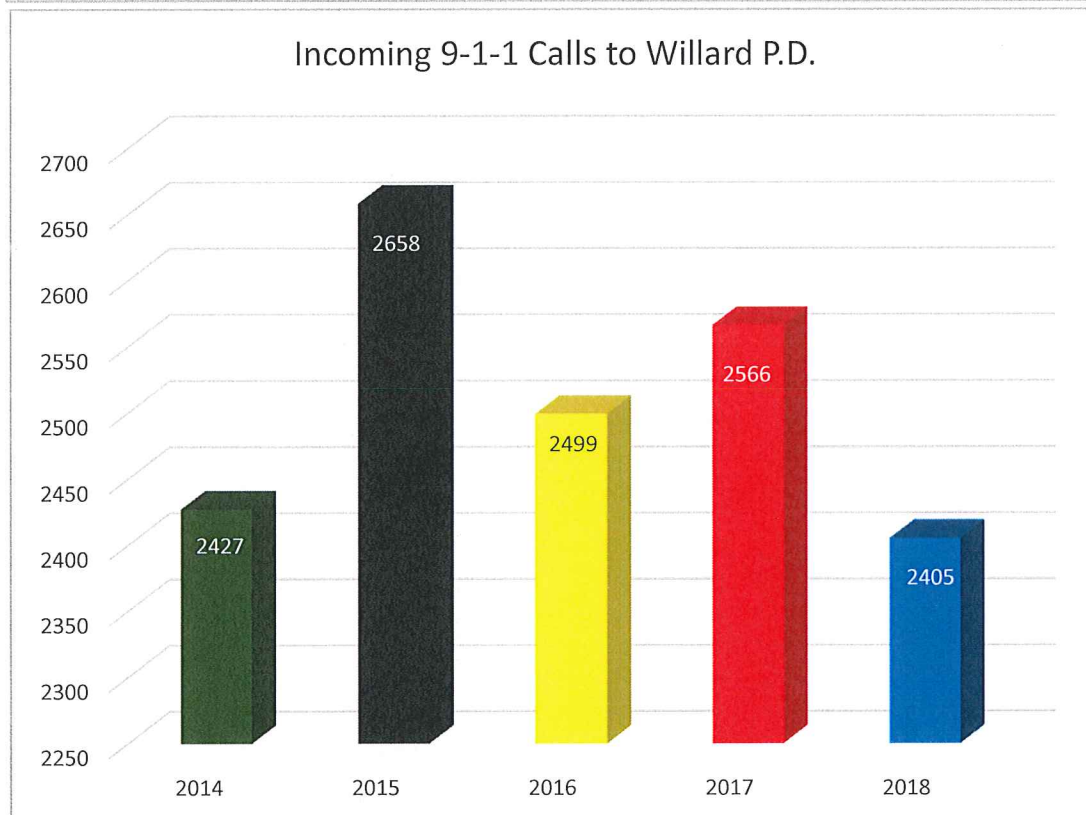
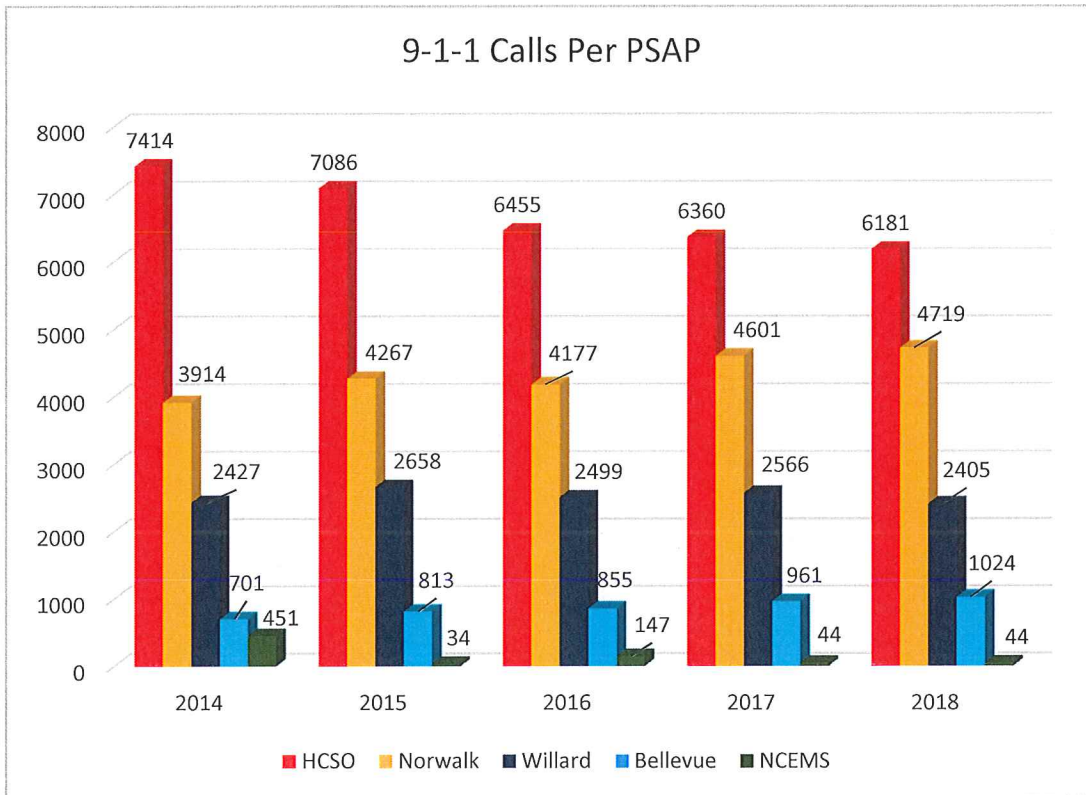
Total Calls For Service Comparison (Emergency and Non-Emergency Calls)



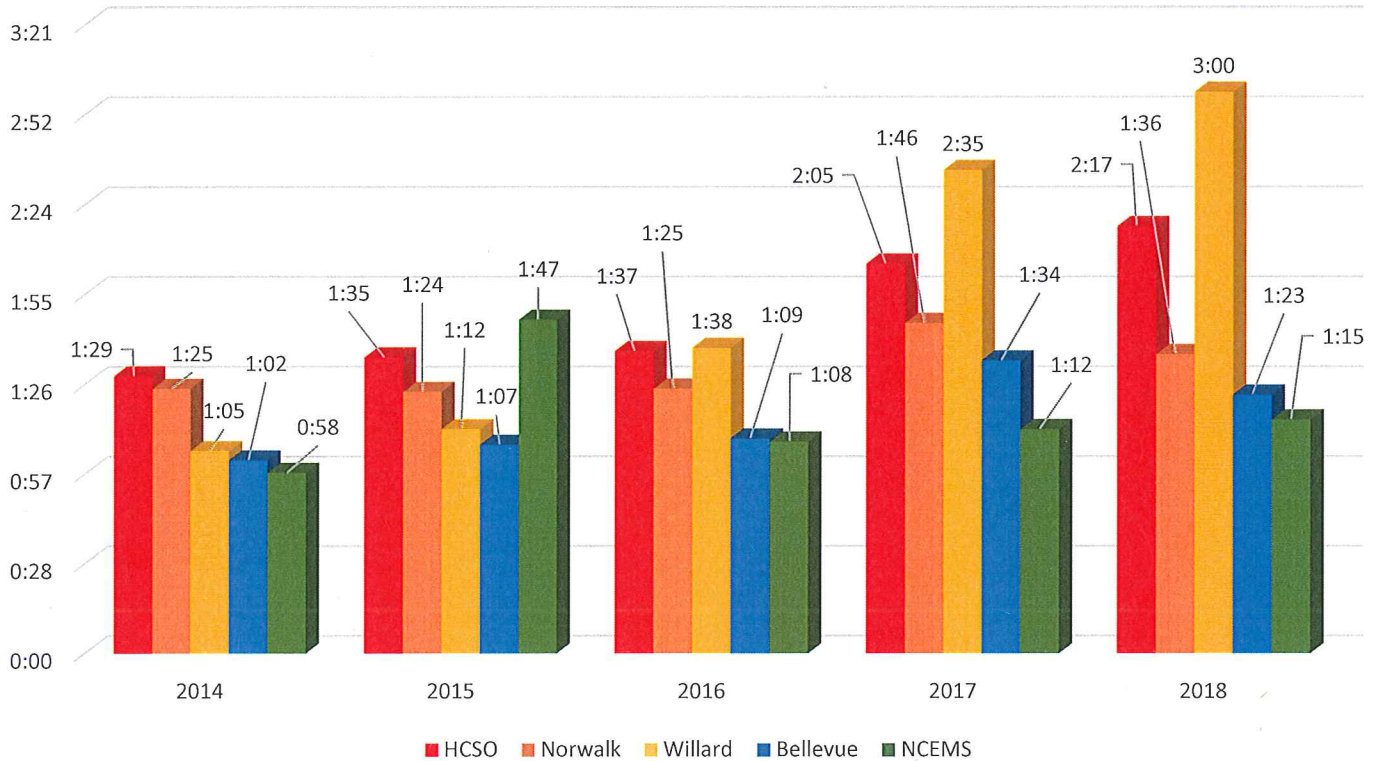
Traffic Stop Frequency Comparison



Dispatch Statistics Comparison, 2014-2018



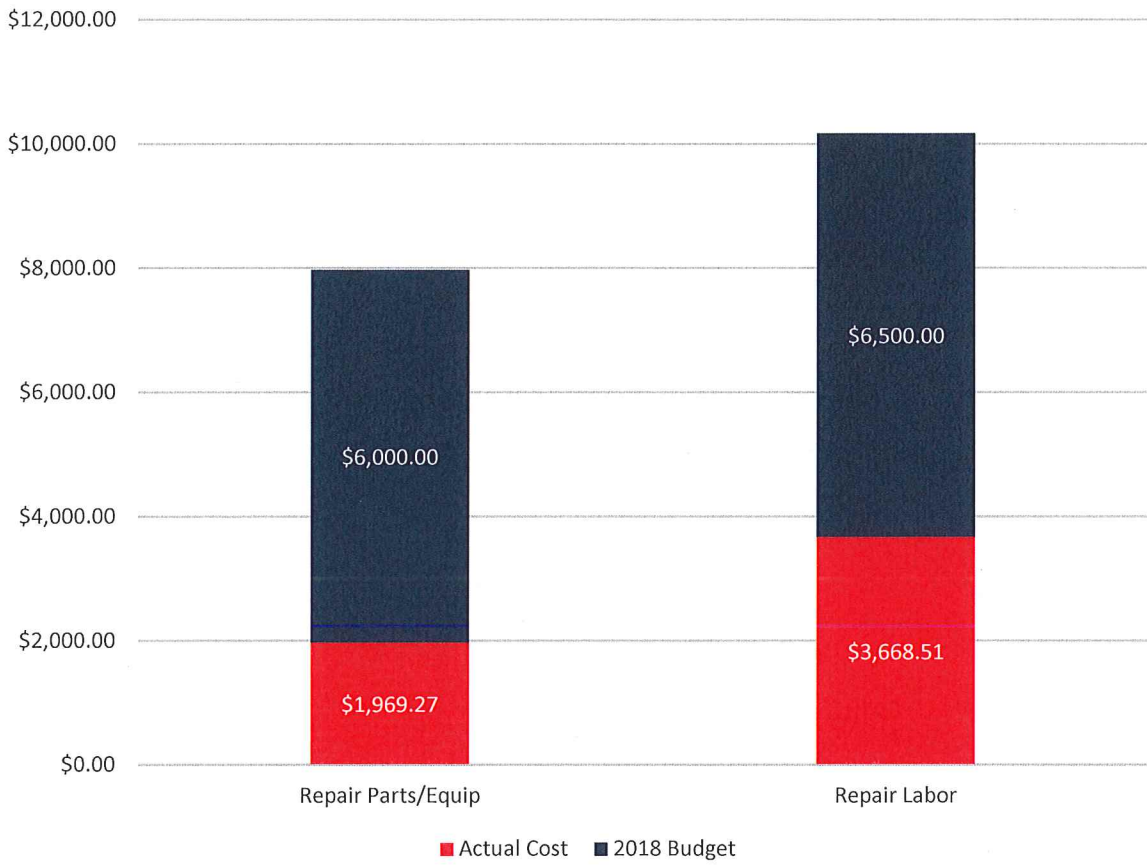
Average 9-1-1 Call Time, Per PSAP



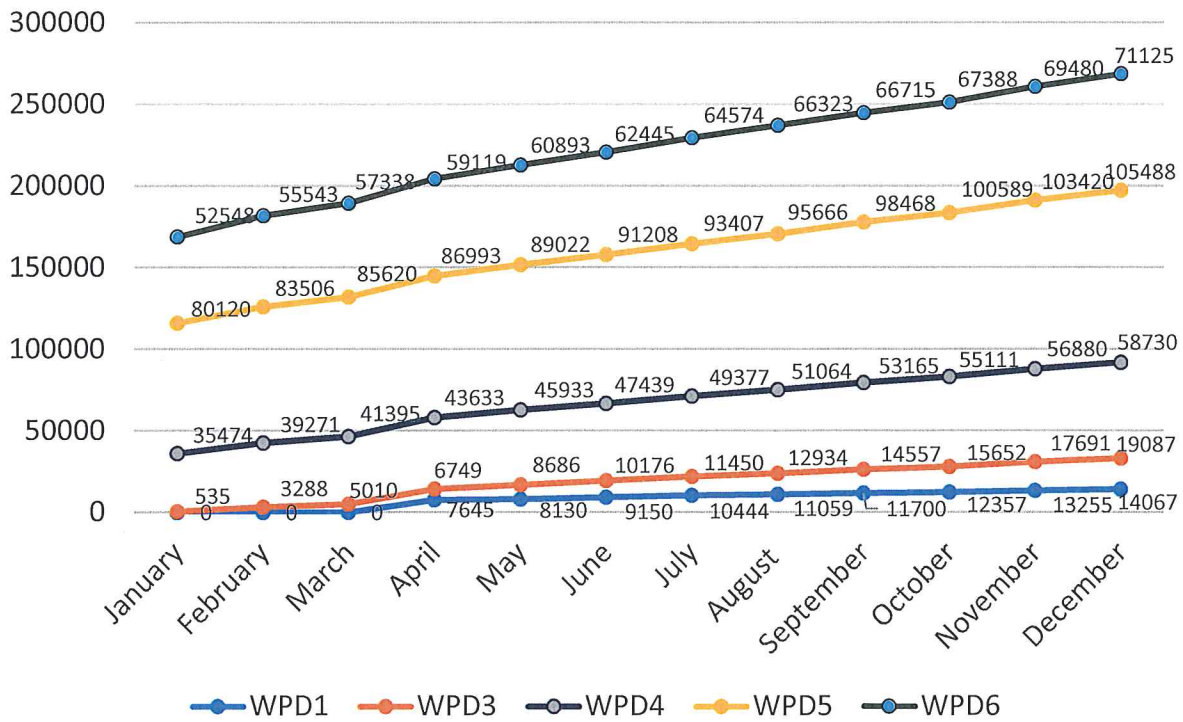
- The above graph depicts the average length of time it takes each agency to process a 9-1-1 call from the time the telecommunicator picks up the call to the time the call is disconnected.
- Willard's Dispatch Center's averages range from 1 minute and 5 seconds each call in 2014, to steadily rising to 3 minutes per call in 2018.
- This is a direct reflection of the Public Safety Telecommunicator and Emergency Medical Dispatch certifications we have obtained.
- The training teaches to stay connected to the caller, and to provide potentially life-saving instructions until help arrives, accounting for the increase in average call time.
- Many calls we complete are longer than 3 minutes. For example, time spent with callers having actual emergencies are longer depending on the time it takes Police/Fire personnel to respond to the emergency.
- A call coming from a location inside the city of Willard will have help arriving much sooner than a call coming from a location in Holiday Lakes.
- There are also factors that bring our average down. For example, many 1-second long 9-1-1 hang up calls are received by each agency.

2018 Repair Cost vs. Budget Amount

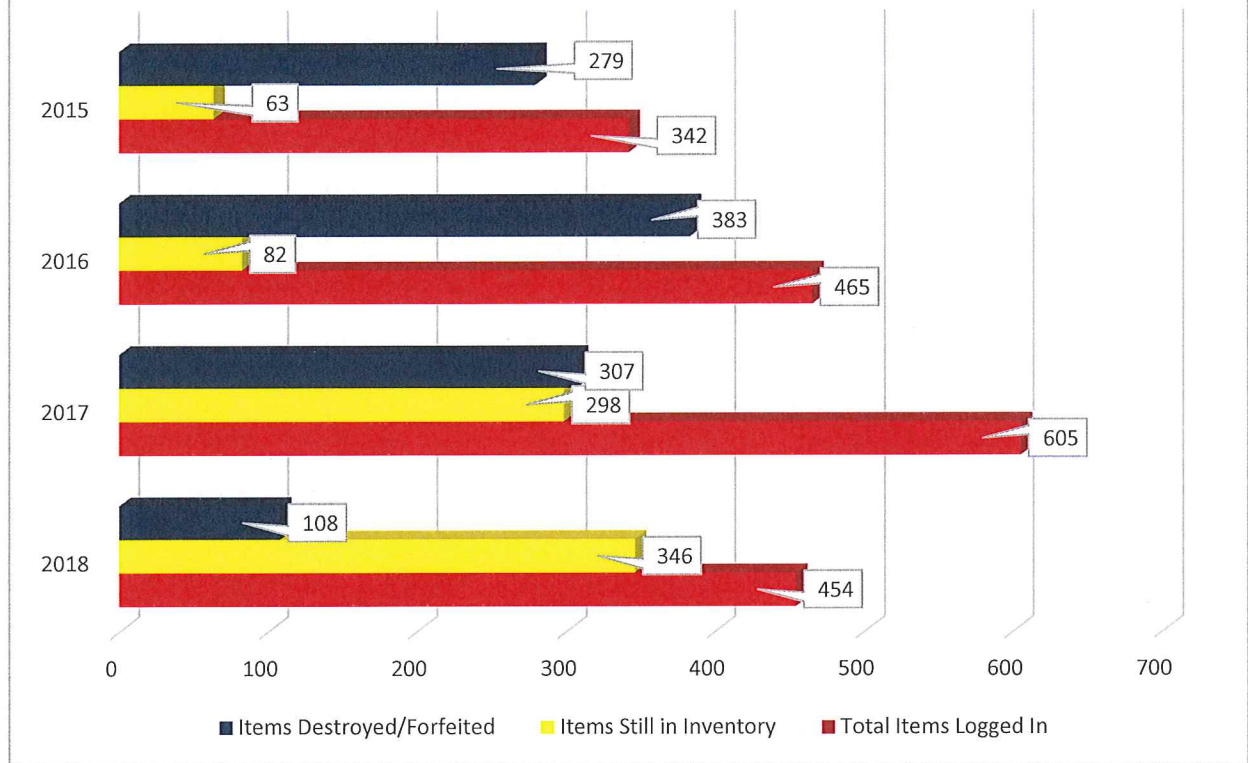


Vehicle Mileage 2018



Evidence Room Report

Items Logged/Disposed of Per Year



- At the end of 2018, the evidence room holds a total of 930 items (from 1999 to December 31st, 2018).
- These items include, drugs, related drug paraphernalia, money, guns, sexual assault kits, and any other items that officers deem necessary to keep to aide in prosecuting criminals.
- Most items are only disposed of by court order. Some items are ordered by the court to be forfeited to Willard PD, including money and guns.
- Evidence disposals are held at least once a year.
- In cases of serious crimes, we are required to keep some items indefinitely.
- Because of this, some items that are still in inventory are from as far back as 1999.
- The evidence room is fully inventoried twice per calendar year.
- All items are present and accounted for.

Some of this year's Prison sentences issued are as follows:

- Seferino Maltos – 4 years 11 months for crimes including narcotic sales and weapons violations. Mr. Maltos also received an additional 2 years 6 months for a joint investigation with Willard Police and Huron County Sheriff Department which was conducted in 2017 for a total of 7 years 5 months.
- Kyle Weiner – 4 years 11 months for theft, forgery, and Methamphetamine trafficking.
- Antonio Kimbro – 39 months for theft and narcotic trafficking. While on bond for a Theft From the Elderly offense Mr. Kimbro sold narcotics to a Confidential Informant which made him eligible for Prison as a first time felony offender, which is where he currently resides.
- Kipling Duncan – 3 years for burglary and receiving stolen property.
- Danny Stephens – 2 years 6 months for narcotic sales and possession.

- Daniel Oxender – 2 years 6 months for child endangering from a 2017 case in which Sgt. Gillmor and I investigated.
- Rachel Bryant and Chris Tuttle each received 2 years 6 months for child endangering from a 2017 case in which Sgt. Gillmor and I investigated.
- Emery Slone – 2 years for trafficking narcotics.
- Curtis Newsome – 18 months for burglary and theft from an elderly Willard resident.

Through 2018 Willard Detectives worked a variety of investigations. This is a small synopsis of some of those investigations:

- **January 2018:** Willard Police Department worked with the Huron County Sheriff Department, as well as with the U.S. Marshals in locating Seferino Maltos. Mr. Maltos was a fugitive on numerous Huron County Common Pleas cases that were filed for crimes occurring and investigated by Willard Police Department. When Mr. Maltos was located at a residence in Toledo Ohio, he was in possession of a large amount of cash, various illegal narcotics, and firearms which was seized. Mr. Maltos has several charges still pending in the arresting jurisdiction for possessing these items.
- Also in January 2018, Willard Police investigated a Burglary complaint in which several firearms were taken from a residence. Some of the firearms were recovered during the investigation. In the end 4 individuals were prosecuted for charges related to the Burglary.
- **February 2018:** Assisted Juvenile Officer Gillmor and SRO Tackett in investigating a threat made towards the Willard City Schools. After a thorough investigation, the threat was found to be unreliable. A juvenile was held responsible for the incident however.
- **March 2018:** Willard Police Department executed a search warrant at the residence of Hope McVeigh, and Johnathon Stover. This warrant was in response to a several month long narcotic investigation. The search warrant produced charges including Possession of Narcotics and Having Weapons Under Disability. During the search warrant a firearm was located in very close proximity to a variety of narcotics and paraphernalia. Both occupants of the residence had been previously been convicted of Felony offenses which prohibited them from possessing the firearm. The firearm was also found to be registered in the name of a different Willard resident who is currently under Felony Indictment for Trafficking in Heroin and prescription medication (some of which were in the presence of a juvenile).
- Also in March, I was assisting the U.S. Marshals in Willard with locating unrelated individuals, when a person was observed leaving a residence known to be trafficking narcotics. This individual had an active arrest warrant, and items located during the arrest led to a second search warrant being executed on this residence in less than 6 months. This second search warrant resulted in 3 individuals being arrested. Danny Stephens, who was one of the residents, had been on bond through Huron County Common Pleas Court at the time of the search warrant for Trafficking in Heroin. The new charges led Danny Stephens to be sentenced to 30 months in Prison as a first time felony offender, which is where he currently resides.

- Furthermore, in March 2018, Willard Police began a lengthy investigation into the Extortion of a Willard victim, involving a Michigan suspect, as well as a local business that was also victimized. This investigation led to the search of 2 Michigan residences where a substantial amount of evidence was recovered, some of which is still being processed by BCI. The suspect in this case is currently being prosecuted in the Huron County Common Pleas Court and the investigation is ongoing into some of the evidence seized during these searches.
- **April 2018:** Several Willard residents, as well as a couple Willard businesses reported a subject had entered into their property and items were taken as a result. Some of the property was from numerous vehicles in which the vehicle batteries were removed from the vehicles by cutting the main wire harnesses of the vehicles causing extensive damage to the vehicles in the process. One of the businesses was entered by tearing open the siding of the building, and items were stolen from inside. During the investigation, Dustin Burton was arrested for each of these incidents. Mr. Burton was charged for each of the crimes committed.
- Also in April 2018 Willard Police Department executed a residential search warrant on the residence of Dustin Lindsey. This warrant was in response to a drug investigation, and narcotic items were seized from the residence. Mr. Lindsey later pled guilty to several narcotic charges, some of which were in the presence of juveniles, and he is currently awaiting sentencing for his crimes.
- **June 2018:** The Willard VFW reported their business had been unlawfully entered, and they were missing a sum of money as a result of the entry. During the investigation, a former employee was found to be the person responsible. The former employee gave a confession during the investigation, and the case is still in the trial process through the Huron County Common Pleas Court.
- Also during June 2018, I assisted Crawford County Sheriff Department in locating a Willard resident that had committed crimes in their jurisdiction. The resident (Starlette Batrez) was located driving in the Willard area, she was arrested and her vehicle was seized due to her Felony indictment. Ms. Batrez was initially sentenced to probation for her crimes, but in August she overdosed in Willard. Crawford County was contacted about the overdose and Ms. Batrez was then sentenced to 2 years in prison for her crimes.
- **August:** Officer Malson came in contact with a male (Ryan Enderby) overdosing in a vehicle in the area of the Willard Country Inn. This overdose led to several further investigations. The first of which was a residential search warrant that was executed on a hotel room occupied by Jordin Duncan and Leigha Lacy. During the search warrant, 12.53 grams of Heroin and Fentanyl was seized. To put this amount in perspective, when we perform narcotic purchases, a typical dose that is sold is between .01-.03 grams of product, which is also the amount most of our narcotic overdose subjects ingest prior to overdosing. Also seized during the warrant was paraphernalia, some cash, and a vehicle. This incident also led to an investigation into a fatal overdose that had occurred outside the City of Willard. Due to the amount of information I had received about the overdose, Willard Police has handled the investigation which has led to 18 total Felony charges including the F-1 charge of Involuntary Manslaughter on both Mr. Duncan, and Ms. Lacy for their involvement in providing Seth Ratliff with a fatal dose of narcotics. These are all still active cases through Huron County Common Pleas Court.


- **September 2018:** On September 14, 2018 I presented cases to a Huron County Grand Jury representing a total of 27 people indicted on 65 narcotic charges. On September 19, 2018 Willard Police, along with assistance from Huron County Sheriff Department, and Plymouth Police arrested 10 individuals that were indicted on the previous weeks Grand Jury (4 people were already in jail at the time of the round-up). To date all but 2 individuals have been located and arrested on Trafficking charges from this operation.
- **November 2018:** In November 2018, Willard resident Travis McDonald committed several crimes to include a burglary, theft of pills, and attempted Conveyance of Drugs into the Jail. Mr. McDonald was released from the Huron County Jail for medical reasons, on the order to return the following week. Mr. McDonald did not return to jail as ordered and after a short investigation, a residential search warrant was issued and executed on a residence that he had been living in. Mr. McDonald was not present at the time of the search warrant, but 2 other Willard residents were arrested during the execution of the search warrant. Mr. McDonald was located and arrested later the same day at a relative's house.
- Also in November 2018 the Willard VFW was entered again, and money was again taken during this incident. A suspect was identified during the investigation, and he is currently in the Huron County Jail for the crime, and the case is being prosecuted in the Huron County Common Pleas Court. The preventative measures the VFW organization has taken to prevent being a victim has certainly helped the investigation and apprehension of the suspect.
- **December 2018:** On December 07, 2018 an assault took place at a Willard residence which sent a Willard resident to Mercy Hospital. During the attack, Samantha Woodson had struck a male in the back of the head with a metal device that caused a large gash to the back of the male's head. Ms. Woodson, who had been on bond for Trafficking both Heroin and Methamphetamine, was charged with F-2 Felonious Assault as a result of the incident. Ms. Woodson is still at large, and it has been reported that she fled back to Oklahoma (where she is originally from) with her family members to avoid prosecution for her crimes. Ms. Woodson's active warrants will remain on file until she is located and ultimately arrested.
- Also in December 2018, a Willard resident was the victim of a Burglary in which several guitars were taken. During the investigation, several guitars were recovered from a couple locations, and 2 people are currently in Jail on charges stemming from the incident.

Other notable events in 2018 that the Willard Detective Bureau took part of include:

- In February 2018 I became a member of the U.S. Marshals and continue to assist the Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force Richland County Division in investigations and apprehensions. This partnership helps Willard Police Department work with other Law Enforcement agencies on investigations, and assists each agency in being able to work crimes more efficiently. The partnership also makes tools and programs available to assist apprehending fugitives who have committed crimes in Willard Ohio. Some of the apprehensions I was a part of include several Murder and Armed Robbery suspects in the Northern Ohio region, as well as assisting in apprehensions of suspects having warrants for other violent offenses. Ofc. Salazar has also attended training with me and the U.S. Marshals, including firearms training, interactive training in building searches, and training using other fugitive recovery methods.

- Willard Police Department took part in a national Drug Take-back event in each April and October. During the events residents turned in approximately 97.8lbs of medication. This event is focused in keeping expired and unwanted medication from getting into the wrong hands or becoming abused.
- On January 27, 2018 Sgt. Gillmor assisted me with a presentation that was made to the Willard Elks which focused on the impact drugs has on society, and our community specifically, as well as some of our efforts used to combat the battle against narcotics. The membership was very receptive to the information given, and they were interactive as well which showed their interest in doing whatever they can to help in the continued battle against narcotics in the Willard area.

Juvenile Officer's Annual Report 2018

The overall Juvenile complaints and juveniles dealt with decreased in 2018 compared to last year. Juvenile related complaints decreased approximately 8% from 2017. One exception to the decrease was unruly complaints, which increased by approximately 33%. The juvenile officer worked closely with Huron County Children Services, the school resource officer, and the detective by assisting with numerous investigations involving minors. The growing trend of internet use and cell phone technology seems to be prevalent among most investigations. The juvenile officer was a member of the multi-disciplinary team involving the Child Advocacy Center which is used for interviewing child victims. The juvenile officer also assisted in the creation of a drone club at Willard High School and helped by mentoring students in the club after school. The juvenile officer graduated from project leadership in 2018 as well as received certifications in field training officer and OPOTA instructor. Some other highlights from the year include:

January 2018 Spoke to a group at the Willard Elks Lodge about the current trends of drug traffickers and drug abuse. This was presented to approximately 40 members that consisted of Elks lodges from across the region.

March 2018 Assisted Willard City Schools in providing a presentation from the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. Lexi Giering from ICAC spoke to all students in the high school as well as the middle school about internet, cyber, and cell phone app safety and security.

May 2018 Conducted the 45th Annual Bike Rodeo at the Willard Park. There were approximately 105 bikes that participated in the course. The course and program teaches kids about bicycle safety. Officers spoke to children at Willard Schools about Bicycle Safety. This year the Bike Rodeo was combined with the "Touch a Truck" event. The Program allows children and their parents to look and sit in various vehicles. A Mercy Hospital Life Flight Helicopter flew in to participate in the event.

May 2018 The juvenile officer spoke to Willard High School students at career day about law enforcement training and careers.

June 2018 Conducted Helmet Smart Program in conjunction with AAA (Bicycle Safety)

September 2018 Participated in AAA Youth Driver Competition Program The Willard Police Department and Willard Schools hosted the program this year. The program consists of students from area high schools and rates them based on how well they perform on a driving course. Willard High School participated in the challenge.

In conclusion, goals set for the Juvenile Office for 2019 include:

- To complete alcohol and tobacco compliance checks of merchants
- To provide more awareness and education to students regarding internet safety to reduce the chances of being victimized.
- To continue to participate and improve the community programs conducted in the past.

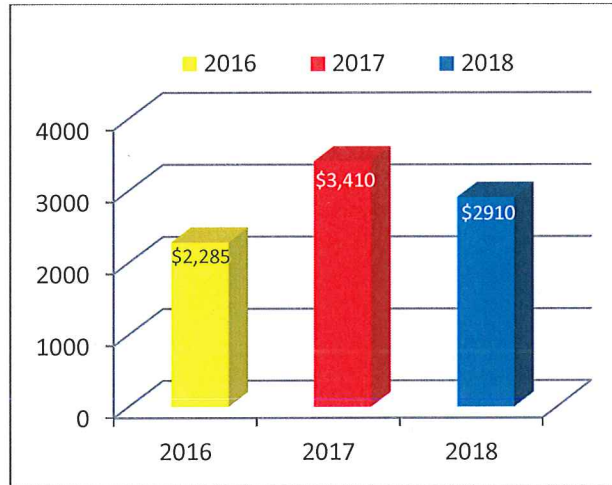
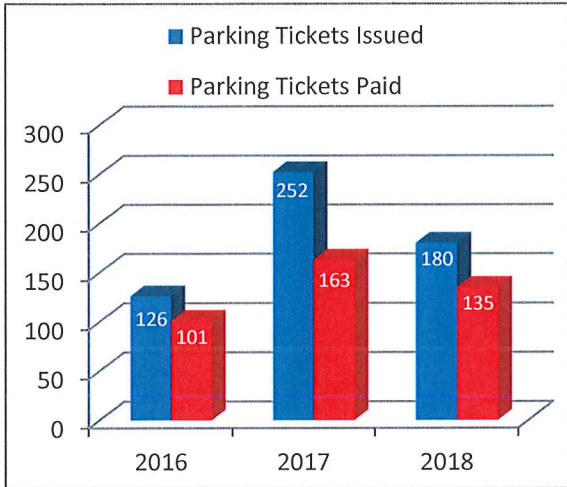

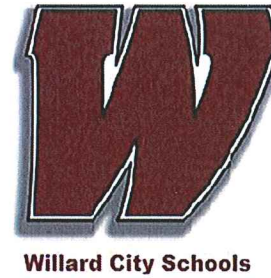


- 180 Parking Tickets were issued in 2018
